## NURSES CALL FOR RESPECT

## **NURSES DEMAND RESPECT AND SOLUTIONS, NOT BAND-AIDS**

The provincial government and health care employers must show respect for Alberta's nurses in bargaining for a new collective agreement

UNA members sent a strong message when they voted to reject a Mediator's Recommended Terms of Settlement in October. *Employers and the Alberta Government must be prepared to negotiate a settlement that treats nurses with respect.* 

UNA and the employers have now returned to the bargaining table. *UNA will do its utmost to reach a contract satisfactory to its members*.

The shortage of nurses, general understaffing, and disrespect for nurses' work-life balance in Alberta has resulted in a burnout crisis in Alberta. Many nurses are leaving their profession or leaving the province because they are done tolerating unsafe working conditions for patients and themselves. *Nurses need more than a Band-Aid to be persuaded that progress is being made!* 

The cost of living in Alberta has increased dramatically over several years, with this province experiencing the highest inflation rate in the nation. *Nurses want to be assured that when they go to work they have all the tools available to deliver the best patient care possible.* 

Safe staffing saves lives! The government and employers need to acknowledge and understand that understaffing and underfunding have a negative impact on patient safety and health care accessibility for Albertans. Employers must not try to pursue a bargaining strategy that makes things worse.

The staffing crisis is causing rural communities to increasingly find themselves without an emergency department to turn to. *By far the most common reason for ERs having to temporarily shut down, many for 20 days or longer, was because staff were unavailable.* 

## **DAY OF ACTION: TALKING POINTS**

UNA

UNA members are deeply concerned about the government's plan to break up public health care into multiple bureaucracies. *This plan sets the stage for privatization, higher costs and worse care.* 

Albertans shouldn't have to deal with five or more agencies to get the health care they need. More agencies, more rules and more confusion won't fix health care in Alberta.

Creating more and more agencies won't make health care cheaper, safer or more effective. Alberta's government needs to make health care simple to get, not more complicated.

Instead of hiring more front-line nurses, the government is creating more bureaucratic agencies with duplicate administrative costs. *The government should be hiring more front-line nurses, not creating five or more new human resources departments.* 

Breaking health care into multiple expensive bureaucracies will see specialty treatments concentrate in Alberta's big cities. *The UCP's health care 'reform' will make rural health care harder to find.*
